

Executive Order 6102

I've always said that my dad started my coin collecting by taking a metal detector to the local park. But it hit me the other day that my first coin was given to me by my maternal great grandmother at Christmas in 1979. It was a 1901 gold piece. She gave 5 of them between 1960 and 1979 to her son and daughter (my grandmother), my mom and her cousin, Genie and me. Mine was the last one given. The five coins she gave were all that was left from my 2nd great grandfather's hidden stash. Great Grandma had the coins that went to the girls encased so they could be worn as necklaces. I'm sure she was thinking more about the sentimental aspect rather than the monetary value. I heard the story that came with this coin many times over the years. The synopsis of the story went like this: Pa (my 2nd great grandfather) did not turn in his gold when the recall law was passed. I recently ran across that coin and it got me wanting to know more about this law.

Executive Order 6102 was a presidential action that was signed by President Franklin Roosevelt on April 5, 1933. This order 'forbid the hoarding of gold coins, bullion and certificates in the continental U.S.' This limit on gold ownership lasted until Gerald Ford signed legislation legalizing private ownership on December 31, 1974. The purpose of Executive Order 6102 was to boost the economy during the depression. The Federal Reserve needed the gold to back any Federal Reserve notes that were issued. Citizens who had gold coins, bullion and certificates were given until May 1, 1933 to surrender their gold to a Federal Reserve Bank. However, not everyone was required to turn their gold in. Exemptions included artists, jewelers, dentists etc; individuals owning less than \$100 in gold coins and coins with numismatic value. Anyone who surrendered their gold was compensated for it at the rate of \$20.67 per troy ounce.

There were rumors of safe deposit boxes being searched and the contents confiscated. However, this was rare. There were only a few of these cases. They mostly seemed to be tied to other violations of federal law.

There couldn't have been many of these searches or my 2nd great grandfather would have been found. He must have turned some of his gold in. But I'm, also, sure that he didn't turn in any way near all of it. And I'm sure most of it was kept in his home or buried in his wife's garden. This had to be true as his wife lived off of it for 20 years following Pa's death in 1939 and some were still lingering in the family in 1979.

Infantry Soldier Silver Dollar

On June 14, 1775, 10 companies of light infantry (soldiers who fight on foot) were formed. The Infantry played and continues to play the major role in gaining and protecting freedom for us and our allies. That first infantry has developed into the current U.S. Armed Forces.

The Infantry has seven values, which are the same as the U.S. Army's seven values: honor, integrity, duty, selfless service, personal courage, loyalty, and respect. Although the infantry is only one branch of the Army, its members have earned more than half of all the Medals of Honor awarded and have suffered three-quarters of the casualties.

Fifteen U.S. Presidents, including Andrew Jackson, Ulysses S. Grant, and Dwight D. Eisenhower, served in the Infantry and saw combat action. Infantrymen fight in all kinds of weather, among all cultures, and over every kind of terrain.

The coin's design symbolizes the Infantry's courage, pride, sacrifice, history, and sense of duty.



Reverse

Features the crossed rifles insignia, the branch insignia of the Infantry. Since all members of the Infantry wear this insignia, it is known everywhere.

Obverse

Features a modern Infantry soldier on rocky ground charging forward and beckoning troops to follow. This image captures the essence of the Infantry's motto, "Follow Me."
